Second Annual Bring Her Home: Stolen Daughters of Turtle Island Exhibit Opening

Minneapolis, Minnesota — Native American Community Development Institute (NACDI) announces the return of the second annual exhibition *Bring Her Home: Stolen Daughters of Turtle Island* at the All My Relations Gallery on view from February 14th, 2019 to June 21, 2019. The All My Relations Arts gallery exhibit opening reception will be February 14th, at 6:00 pm.

Bring Her Home is a project organized by All My Relations Gallery, an initiative of NACDI, in partnership with the Minnesota Indian Women's Resource Center, and American Indian Community Housing Organization. The exhibition is curated by Angela Two Stars and assistant curator Moira Villard.

"We are incredibly grateful to all the women who made this show possible. With an accomplished team and artists, we were able to produce a timely must-see exhibit," said Rory Wakemup, Director of All My Relations Gallery.

Featuring original work by 20 Indigenous artists from across the United States and many tribal nations, *Bring Her Home* highlights the ongoing epidemic of missing and murdered Indigenous women. In light of the local movement to stop sexual exploitation and the international [#MMIW](#) awareness campaign, *Bring Her Home* shares visual stories of the impacted women through paintings, digital work, sculpture, and photography.

Featured artists include Jaune Quick-To-See Smith, Avis Charley, Molly Murphy Adams, Karen Goulet, Angela Babby, Wade Patton, Leah Yellowbird, and more.

"It has been an honor curating this exhibit for the second year in a row. Our hope is that this exhibit can help raise awareness and tell the stories that honor victims and families of Missing Murdered Indigenous Women," said curator Angela Two Stars.
